President's Message February 2008

It seems that we just got through the holiday whirlwind and it is February already. Our Swap Meet is on February 24th this year - and hopefully the weather will cooperate! Your chairman, Don Azevedo and Registrar, Norm Schwartz are busy with preparations and space reservations are off to a good start. Our meet is much appreciated by our vendors, most of whom return year-after-year. Many of you are aware of this – but as a touring member of our club you are entitled to a \$25 discount on a swap space. This is because in order to preserve our non-profit tax status all swap meet vendors become "associate members" of our club, and their "dues" are the cost of their swap space - \$40 for one space. As a touring member, you have already paid your \$25 membership dues and if you would like a swap space, dues are credited - so you can have a swap space for an additional \$15. Bring out some of that rusty (or shiny) stuff you have been hoarding and recycle it!

As always, we need everyone's help for set-up on Saturday morning, February 23, and at the meet on Sunday. You do not need volunteer for both – or the whole day – most tasks are broken down into 2 to 3 hours shifts and their jobs suitable for people of all ages, abilities and talents. If you have not already signed up with Don, I am sure he would appreciate hearing from you. The financial viability of our club is dependent on a successful swap meet – and a successful swap meet is dependent on our members' help.

We also would appreciate if you would bring a car to display. Seeing our "early iron" at the meet stimulates interest that people may have in horseless carriages - and can lead to new members joining the club – and we do need new members to survive and thrive.

A successful touring season requires volunteers to sponsor tours. We typically kick the year off with a Green Brass tour in March, and I do not believe we have a volunteer to chair that event - and several other tours in 2008, yet. I am sure Tour Chairman Don Azevedo would love to hear from you. Feel free to pick a familiar theme like kite flying, ice cream social, car collection or garage visit; pumpkin or holiday tour; better yet, create something new! It is easy to put on a one-day tour; you just need a suitable route and maybe something interesting to visit, a defined starting place with trailer parking, plus a map and directions for all. While the board has not approved our budget for 2008 (we usually wait until after the swap meet so we know what our income will be) we typically have a budget of about \$300 to underwrite the cost of a one-day tour.

Continuing with my "help wanted" theme, Vice President Don Johnson is looking for members who can help with entertainment for our monthly meetings. Do you have a special interest, collection, skill or video that our members would find interesting?

One final note, Jim Boyden a member of the Santa Clara Valley chapter and HCCA National Secretary contacted me to ask if the BAHCC would consider expanding the Bay Area Tour next year and work in conjunction with the Santa Clara Valley chapter to sponsor a National (Northern CA) Tour in 2009. Our Board discussed the concept at our January meeting and generally supports the idea. I am sure this will be a topic for discussion at the February general meeting. Well ... that's it for now ... BERNARD METAIS– NEW MEMBER PROFILE and Déjà Vu

In writing this, I am reminded of Paul Harvey, and "The Rest of the Story". You'll see why.

At our January 2008 General Meeting, Ed and Karen Archer introduced their guest, Mr. Bernard Metais, who had visited the club about six months ago, and had been a member of the Bay Area Horseless Carriage Club from 1973 through 1990. Bernard should have gotten onto the 2007 roster, then, but didn't. Probably my fault. Sorry.

When introduced by Ed, Bernard was asked to say a few words. Bernard had some cleaver things to say about restoring his 1912 Ford Model T to "as new" condition. He said also that he was sorry to say that he could not personally be restored himself to original or "like new" condition. The later humor might have been lost on the audience, but I was listening, and kind of intrigued by the "wit" used to compare an overhaul on a car, with a physical restoration on oneself. It was cute and cleaver.

As an FYI, it turns out that Bernard was in Madagascar on business in 1987, and contracted a serious illness leaving both of his legs totally paralyzed. He was flown home to San Francisco for treatment. After much improvement, his left foot is still paralyzed. Bernard walks with a cane, which I noticed last Summer, but at 77 years old he really gets around very well.

At the close of the meeting, I prevailed on Dave Pava and Don Azavedo to get me an application, and presented it to Bernard, who immediately filled it out and handed me his check for \$25.00. Never miss an opportunity again to get a new member. I reviewed the application then and there, knowing that it was an old application form, and had Bernard fill out additional information, email, etc. now needed for our Roster.

During the course of our conversation, Bernard told me that he normally spent the five Winter months including Christmas in Paris, where he and his wife own an apartment close to the Notre Dame Cathedral. Paris is where Bernard grew up, so he is a true "Parisian", and tells stories with a delightful French accent.

I mentioned that our family had a home in Quebec, and when we visit there, we considered ourselves "French", French being the native language in Quebec. English is more prevalent now in urban Quebec, but once you get to the rural areas, if you don't speak any French, you're stuck using hand signals. In rural Quebec, unless you

can say "una mas Cervesa (no, that's Spanish), in Quebec its "un Bleu", you won't get another beer either, since "Bleu" is Molson's beer in Canada.

Bernard mentioned time spent in Montreal many years ago on business. I inquired as to what he did for a living before retiring in 2000 at age 70. He worked for Bechtel in San Francisco for over 35 years, had a mechanical engineering degree, masters degree and doctorate, chemical engineering, I think. Hummm, interesting what you learn in a short conversation and Bernard wasn't bragging.

However, here's the interesting part, the Déjà Vu, and the "Paul Harvey – Rest of the Story". In 1987, our document restoration firm did a four month project in Montreal due to major flooding in Montreal. Our firm did the document drying for all of the banks, a prominent attorney, the shipyard, etc. Every ten days, I flew back and forth to Montreal to load the machine, and then once I was assured it was running smoothly, I flew back to San Francisco. I even bought a small car to avoid rentals, and rented a small room in Lachine where I stayed for my two or three day visits.

On one of the flights, I was seated next to an intriguing Frenchman, a Bechtel senior manager who had been transferred to Montreal to take over the "AlCan" aluminum plant project Bechtel was building. Bechtel was in a bit of a jam, and none of the prior Bechtel management assigned to the project spoke French. Enter Bernard, which was a smart move for Bechtel since the Quebecois, (natives of Quebec) would only deal with another "French" speaking person.

And, if you recall recent history, the Quebecois rioted when President Charles DeGaule (France) visited and shouting "Vive Le Quebec libre" at a Montreal rally. Also, in the 1980's there was a referendum for Quebec to secede from Canada which lost narrowly, by 1%, like 50% to 49%. That was a serious threat to Canada's sovereignty. So the French take their Quebec very seriously, and to get along in Quebec, you better speak French.

The Bechtel gentlemen's schedule to Montreal was similar to mine, and more than once we were on the same plane. Each flight, I looked for him. He was a mechanical engineer, same as I. We enjoyed telling stories to each other, as well as having dinner in Montreal on a couple of occasions. He lived in Oakland, and worked on his own cars, two Peugeot's (French cars – one

I remember him telling me was a Model 404). Peugeot's were popular in the 1960's, especially if you were from France. But, even then in the 1960's, owning a Peugeot is like owning a Horseless Carriage, you either like them or you don't. Kind of like "who other than a mother could love Prince Charles, other than the Queen Mum". You get the point.

As we talked after January's club meeting, I began to think that Bechtel couldn't possibly have two high level French speaking engineers from San Francisco working in Montreal in 1987, and asked Bernard if he perhaps was the same man I had befriended twenty years ago on the plane flights. I first mentioned a movie that I watched being filmed (1987) in Lachine with movie star Joe Don Baker (an actor from the 1980's). Joe Don played a detective who trudged down a rainy street to meet with the Boston Police. The rain storm was done by sprinklers above the roofs of the buildings since it was otherwise a beautiful summer day. I even met Joe Don Baker, the star.

Yes, I said "Boston police cars" (these were 1980's Dodge Diplomats with the Boston Logo on them). Filming in Lachine at that time was inexpensive as the US Dollar was about \$0.65, and to make it look like

the US, all the film crew did was cover the street signs and Lachine looked just like any other American town. Bernard had no recollection of the filming episode.

When I told him about the big green machines we used for vacuum freeze drying the business documents, he said "oh, yes, was that you", "I remember it well". (Didn't Maurice Chevalier use that same expression in the move "GiGi", so maybe that's a French expression, no?). Then Bernard said: "You took me out to see the large green machine, and I was fascinated". Déjà Vu.

Anyway, it is funny how things happen, and I certainly hope that the members of the Bay Area Horseless Carriage Club will get to know (re-know is more like it as Bernard was a BAHCC member 1973-1990). He will probably be back in April or May, as he is in Paris now. Please take time to enjoy his company. His 1912 Ford is "up and running" thanks to the efforts of Ed Archer and Bill Brommer and other members of the club...and Bernard tells me that he and his wife will participate in all our functions, excepting when they are in Paris, of course, enjoying "la dolce vita" (Italian, but you know what I mean). This is really one interesting guy.

BAHCC BOARD Meeting Minutes of January 16, 2008 (As yet unapproved)
