Al Luis will be remembered as a long time friend and member of the BAHCC. He passed away on December 24, 2008.



ANTARCTICA EXPEDITION

Did you know that the 7th Continent, Antarctica, is as large as Australia, and 50% bigger than the United States. In 2004 Holland America Line added "Antarctica" to its 17 or 21 day itinerary from Rio De Janeiro to Valpariso, Chile. This is a trip of a lifetime.

Our adventure (Jan. 2-26, 2009) started by flying to Santiago, Chile, then boarding a first class bus to Mendoza, Argentina through the Andes Mountains and a 9000 ft pass. We could have flown directly, but read about this trip in another book, and it provided beautiful scenery, and an excellent 250 mile vista into the wine country of central Argentina. We opted out of a 20 hour bus ride to Buenos Aires, and flew 600 miles to this 1800's renaissance city resembling Paris. Florida Street,



the famous shopping district, was excellent for shopping and dining on Argentine beef.

After two nights in Buenos Aires, we boarded our 5 Star home on the seas, Holland American Lines "Amsterdam", a 1300 passenger liner built in 2000. The 17 day voyage took us down the east coast of South American, to Antarctica, then up the western coast of Chile to Valpariso, Chile. Other passengers boarded four days earlier in Rio de Janeiro for a 21 day cruise. The ship was full, mostly of Americans and Canadians. Excellent ship, excellent food, excellent entertainment. Nicely done, again by Holland America Lines.

Our first stop was the Falkland Islands where the British fought a "War" with Argentina in 1984. The Falkland's, consisting of several hundred small islands east of Argentina, have no trees, no minerals, but loads of wild life, penguins, seals and birds as well as 1200 humans plus 2000 British military. And, a lot of wind. Sometimes passengers can not get ashore due to the wind, which gusts 50 knots and more, but we got ashore, looked at the penguins, and got back on the ship. On the windy days the penquins hunker down, or else they are blown into the sea.





Leaving Falklands, "Amsterdam" took us 600 miles across Drakes Passage on the southern tip of South America into the islands of the Antarctic Peninsula. Antarctica is a sanctuary by treaty which will not be developed by anyone. Presently 1200 researchers live at numerous "base camps" from various countries. The research season is short, about 3 months, December to February and few remain behind for the long "winter".

During the three days we were there, "Amsterdam" cruised through



hundreds of islands, past thousands of birds, penguins, whales and of course numerous icebergs. During the day, our "ice captain" and "Antarctic explorer", both of whom had spent over 40 years each in this area lectured as we watched the scenery go by. By 10 AM the first morning, our "ice captain" counted 802 icebergs. The largest -1 mile long, and smallest - 20 feet long, 90% of which is underwater. The smaller ones could easily "open" up the side of the ship, so "Amsterdam" steered clear, sailing through the bergs, but still very close for a good look at the penguins sunning themselves on the bergs before going swimming. On the third "Antarctic Day", our ship stopped to pick up 10 staff at "Palmer Station", the United States Antarctic research facility, the summer home for 45 researchers. While onboard, the Palmer staff lectured about "life at Palmer Station". Palmer staff were particularly happy to enjoy "a salad" as fresh

food and fruit were delivered only every six weeks to Palmer. For the previous six days, they had been fogged in and hadn't been able to get out of their huts, hence they were happy to see us. Our entire trip was almost fog free, wind free and iceberg free, but these same problems had plagued the same cruise three weeks earlier.

Leaving "Antarctica", we headed North 600 miles north through Drakes Passage, to Ushuaia, Argentina, the southern most town in the world. More penguins, and a chance to see the other numerous ships that did "Antarctica Expeditions" including "Marco Polo II" (A&K high end



explorer ship refurbished 1993 ref:

website: orient.com), and "Minerva" (refurbished 1996). See: adventure-life.com for full list. In Santiago we met some Minerva passengers, and inquired about their cruise. Minerva charged \$12,000 for 16 days versus our cost of \$2500 for 17 days; half of the Minerva's passengers got seasick during the Drake crossing; and, they were disappointed as they couldn't land in the Falkland's because of wind. Our adventure on the 5 star "Amsterdam" was without incident, no seasickness as it was a much larger ship and a better value.

Enroute to Valpariso, Chile we stopped twice arriving in Valpariso on Jan 24th, then took a bus for a two hour ride to Santiago for an overnight stay, and return by air through Atlanta.

For those who have an interest in South America and Antarctica, this is definitely a very relaxed, interesting, affordable 5 star way to see it in the comfort of home. A day or two in the major cities of Buenos Aires, Rio or Santiago would be recommended also. Holland America lines provides this cruise only four times a year (Dec/Feb) and is usually sold out.
