I'm helping to plan this year's Pumpkin Tour, currently scheduled for October 17, 2010. While plans are still being finalized, here is a sketch of the tentative plan for the day. While period dress will be optional, I suspect that it will be greatly admired by the people we meet along the way.

We will gather at 9 am at the Rudgear Road Park 'n Ride lot next to I-680 in Walnut Creek for coffee, donuts and sparkling conversation.

Setting off about 9:45 am, we'll take the back roads to Livermore. Our first stop will be to the pumpkin patch and corn maze at G&M Farms (487 E. Fairway Blvd.). We have been offered preferred parking directly in front of the pumpkin patch. This will be a busy day at the farm and I expect that the many visitors will want to talk with us and learn more about our unique cars and the historical perspective they represent.

At noon we will motor to the Duarte Garage & Lincoln Highway Museum (L St. and Portola Ave.) for a picnic lunch. You should plan to bring your own food and



some to share with others. The Livermore Heritage Guild operates this 1915 garage as a museum, built as a way station on the old Lincoln Highway, the first transcontinental US highway.

At about 2 pm we can proceed through the beautiful downtowns of Livermore and Pleasanton to Sunol to meet the steam train as it returns on its last excursion of the day, or head directly home if the day is getting long for you.

Returning to our starting point via Foothill Rd. and San Ramon Valley Blvd. takes us through charming Danville and completes a 65-mile loop. (Skipping the visit to Sunol would cut about 8 miles and 90 minutes off your day's tour.)

I'm looking forward to seeing you on the 2010 Bay Area Horseless Carriage Club's Pumpkin Tour. The Doctor's 1912 Model T Ford Touring Car

This 1912 Model T Ford Touring Car was found in 1961 in a small wooden shed in Winona, Minnesota, and is what we would call today a Barn Find. The car was about 90% complete and original. The headlamps had been changed from carbide lamps to magneto lamps and was in remarkably good shape considering it was almost 50 years old at the time. It was never restored - just well maintained. When I started to ask all kinds of questions about it's mechanical condition the owner said, "why don't you just give it a test drive ." A test drive! I jumped at the chance. It started easily and ran beautifully. I was sold. The car was purchased and trailered back to Chicago.

It seems that the car had been purchased new in 1912 by a doctor in Winona and was used by him to make his house calls. It was updated for obvious reasons over the years but still retained it's original top and upholstery. The doctor did not do the actual work on the car. He left that to his personal mechanic to handle. When the doctor passed on - the car was willed to the mechanic who took care of it for many more years. In later years the mechanic sold the car to the man that I bought it from.

After getting the car home and checking it out, I decided not to restore it for a while. The car ran so well that it was driven for a year on various old car tours before it was decided to fully restore it. The car was completely torn down and all components checked for wear. The only wear found was a few bushings in the front axle and of course, the 12 rivet differential had to be rebuilt. The engine and transmission were both in such good shape that they were just cleaned up, repainted and put back in the car. All parts of the car were repainted and reassembled. New upholstery was installed along with a new top. It was now ready to tour again. And tour again it did. In 1963 the car was driven from Chicago to Greenfield Village in Dearborn, Michigan, for the celebration of Henry Ford's 100th Birthday. The car made it all the way there and back with no problems - except for 7 flat tires. But that is a another story.

In the picture the car has just won a Second Place prize in the Model T Ford Club's annual restoration contest. Not bad for a car that is not a "Trailer Queen". If I had it to do over again - would I restore it? Knowing what I know today - probably not. It was definitely in the "preservation class".

Skirt Lifters

Many people seeing these strange items puzzle over their purpose, but once their use is revealed, they give a fascinating glimpse into the life of a past age. During most of the nineteenth century, street drainage was haphazard and uncollected garbage was thrown out into the unswept streets that, in many places, were not yet paved with layers of compacted small stones. Full skirted dresses were easily soiled. Many ladies drove in a carriage, or might use the services of a "crossing sweeper", who had to be given a tip.

The skirt lifter was born out of necessity. An early reference for the use of a specific accessory to lift the skirt was mentioned in 1846. Dress clips called Pages, formed in the shape of a Negro's head, attached to the waist by a chain, and were used to clip and hold up the skirt when walking. Another variety, in the Watteau Porte-Jupe', was fashionable in 1859, to render the skirt more manageable, when walking. This was an adjustable ribbon-covered wire loop hooked to the waist through which a fold of skirt could be placed to lift the skirt.

During the 1860's, skirt lifters were devised to lift the overskirt in a series of draped scallops. This was achieved by multiple chains from the waist belt. It is possible that some of the accessories used for lifting the skirt were used more for their decorative effect than the function of lifting the skirt off the ground. In these cases, a brooch or gold clasp might hold gold chains in place, at the waist.

As the trains of dresses got longer and longer, including outdoor dresses, a serviceable dress holder became more and more indispensable. Many devices, some with success and some not, were tried. These devices were to hold the material firmly without injuring the fabric in any way: also, they were to be easily applied.

The Chatelaine dress holder consisted of a waist plaque and hook, and some kind of grasping mechanism. Two are illustrated in the photos. The majority of skirt lifters however, do not have a waist plaque and hook, and were attached to the waist by ribbon, as illustrated by the butterfly example, made by Plant and Green, and registered on October, 1876. These devices look rather like a pair of strange scissors; two pivoted arms ending in cushioned circles, usually of leather, locked by a contrivance at the top between the two arms, and operated by a cord suspended from the waist. I usually use a moiré ribbon with a waist plaque and hook, to hold this type of skirt lifter.

The locking devices were decorated in a variety of ways; hands, butterflies, horseshoes, and other scrolled designs. The clips were almost always made in non-precious metals, usually brass or plated metal. There were a number of different patent styles. Some skirt lifters turn up in pairs, and it is possible that these could have been used when cycling.

I believe I bought my first skirt lifter in Colorado, on a tour with Jan and Jerry Neil many years ago. I was able to use it in Wisconsin in 1996, on the Tour of the Century. I'm not just a collector of accessories, I enjoy wearing them also.
