
Received a note from **Bill W.**, he had surgery on his thyroid (I think that was it) and was unable to talk. Hopes that that is just a temporary condition.


ANNOUNCEMENT REGARDING DINNER BEFORE OUR CLUB MEETINGS

Tech Tip

Do you have a battery powered winch on your trailer? Has it ever failed you when you needed it the most because the battery was dead? Well then here is a helpful tip. Go down to your Trailer/RV store and buy yourself a Solar battery charger. Bolt it to your trailer and connect it to your battery. If kept in full sun the battery will always be ready when you need it. This arrangement works best on a closed trailer where it will be out of harms way on the roof. It will however also work on an open trailer if the charger is placed in a protected area.

54TH ANNUAL HILLSBOROUGH 2010 – SEPT 12, 2010

Summer sun, and a beautiful day graced the 18th and 12th fairways of the Crystal Springs Golf and Country Club (Skyline Blvd at Highway 280 in Hillsborough) for the 54th Annual Hillsborough Concours, featuring almost 300 cars.

200 were on the Field for Judging in various SCCA Classes including Classic – Open, Classic – Closed and Classic European, plus Horseless Carriage, and various foreign and domestic classifications. 50 more cars were special display and the balance were in a "Car Corral" for those who wished to show their cars but not be judged.

The Marque Cars included the Ford Thunderbird of which 30 were on display for years from 1955 to 1965. These looked like a royal family, all lined up in their six separate classes. Alfa Romeo was the foreign marquee, and another 30 Alfa's were on the field including some dating to the 1930's.

This year featured a special "Corvette" group, as well as some 100 year old "Century Cars", some of which came as far away as Los Angeles for the event. George and Elizabeth Knapp (Los Angeles) brought their delightful 1914 Petite Speciale was by far the most interesting of the cars, and had loads of nickel plate, even on the engine. George said it took a week to get the nickel polished, and this car was really a gem. Built in Los Angeles (five were built). This car should have gotten an award for CUTE.

A four door touring 1910 Warren Detroit owned by Dr. Norman Bitter from Fresno was on the field. Dr. Bitter and his wife have a beach cottage in Aptos, and drove in on Sunday for the event. He said that HCCA doesn't have any information on the Warren Detroit, so it is a pretty rare car.

97 year old Milt Cavalli of Redwood City drove his 1915 Saxon Roadster to the event. During the day, Milt talked about its heritage and held "court" with numerous visitors who were glad to see Milt. As the event was winding down, Milt got up, crank started the engine, and drove home. Nice work Milt. Now that we know Milt, maybe some one can bring Milt to the BAHCC meetings. He's older than his car.

Wayne and Lisa Weathers showed their 1914 Oldsmobile 54, and it looked great. Took a trophy. Eric and Christopher Lundquist showed a 1914 Ford C Cab, 1911 Ford Touring, and a 1916/1915 Overland Model 84 touring.

Next year the Concours has been moved to August 28th so as not to interfere with either the Packard meet, the Gatsby, or Kelly Park, all of which were major conflicts with this years date, which incidentally was the only date the golf course was available for in 2010. Next year, hopefully no conflicts, and many more Horseless Carriage Cars.

Those that attended thought the venue was the best ever, and want to come back.



The 2010 Pumpkin Tour, Oct. 17, will aid in restoration of Seagrave

The Livermore Heritage Guild was so excited about our planned visit to the Duarte Garage that they asked us to linger a bit longer. Leveraging our visit during the Pumpkin Tour on Sunday, October 17, 2010, the LHG will invite the public to an open house to see our cars and request donations to help complete the restoration of a mighty 1920 Seagrave fire engine.

While period dress is optional, I suspect that it will be greatly admired by the people we meet at our two stops in Livermore. You should bring your own picnic lunch and beverage, planning something to share with others.

We will gather at 9 am at the Rudgear Road Park 'n Ride lot next to I-680 in Walnut Creek for coffee, donuts and sparkling conversation. Setting off about 9:30 am, we'll take the back roads to Livermore.

Our first extended stop will be to the pumpkin patch and corn maze at G&M Farms (487 E. Fairway Blvd.). We have been offered preferred parking directly in front of the pumpkin patch. This will be a busy day at the farm and I expect that the many families will want to talk with us and learn more about our unique cars and the historical perspective they represent.

At noon we will motor to the Duarte Garage & Lincoln Highway Museum (L St. and Portola Ave.) for a picnic lunch. The LHG operates this

1915 garage as a museum, built as a way station on the old Lincoln Highway, the first transcontinental US highway.

Leaving the Duarte Garage by 3 pm, our return route takes us through the charming downtowns of Pleasanton and Danville. The complete loop is about 60 miles with opportunities for shorter loops if desired.

(We abandoned an earlier plan to also take in the steam train at Sunol, choosing instead to linger a little longer at the Duarte Garage.)

Delivered to the City of Livermore in August, 1920, Seagrave fire engine #25055 fought major area fires through the mid-1950s. Since 2008 a dedicated crew has been involved in a complete, off-frame restoration of the vehicle,

Substantial progress has been made in the restoration effort and a first public starting of the engine in 50 years will be attempted for our visit.

Donations are being requested from the public to ensure completion of the Seagrave restoration. Will you join me and dig some folded portraits of dead presidents out of your pocket and put it in the donation jar during our visit?

I'm looking forward to seeing you on the 2010 Bay Area Horseless Carriage Club's Pumpkin Tour. THE STORY OF JOHN AND CAROLEE'S 1913 CADILLAC

Prologue

I (John) was a Spanish teacher in Fairfield in the late '60s and my hobby was tennis. But it so happened that I befriended a fellow about that time who lived in Vallejo near me and had a 1921 Nash Touring that he had beautifully restored from a pile of rubble. I was fascinated, and soon he offered to introduce me to a guy in Sonoma who had for sale a collection of parts from a 1919 Hudson Touring. So up there we went and I ended up bringing it home. Over the next few years I disassembled what wasn't already disassembled, prepped and painted the frame, had the Babbitt and machine work done to the engine, and gathered more missing parts at swap meets.

Fast Forward

In 1971 I moved from Vallejo to Piedmont to work in the Piedmont school district, and of course filled up my new garage with Hudson parts. A couple of years later I met a student who said his dad was also an old car guy. Within a day his dad knocked on my door and introduced himself, Bud Lundell, a long-time member of the BAHCC. He checked out the Hudson project and said, "It will be just as much work to restore this as it would be to restore a pre '16 car."

I had no idea of the significance of that, but he explained that there was a club for pre '16 cars that had great people and activities, but that for a 1919 car there wasn't anything in place where you could have that much fun. He invited me come with him to BAHCC meetings, and soon afterwards he offered to let me drive his 1913 Cadillac in the upcoming 1978 Fourth of July Parade. I indeed did drive his

1913 Cadillac in that parade, and he drove his 1911 Imperial (a car currently owned by the Eric and Muriel Lundquist). After the parade a large crowd went to Bud's house for a party, and several hours and more than several beers later, Bud offered to sell me the Cadillac.

A deal was reached, and not too long afterward the Hudson project was sold to Gary Borges, who had a couple of other interesting Hudson super six projects also.

So the time flew by and I've been the steward of the Cadillac now for 32 years.

Some Earlier History of the Car

Through research over time I was able to find out that the car had been found in a junk yard outside of Reno in 1948 by a Harrah spotter, and it had subsequently passed through the hands of five other collectors, none of whom had done much to the car. Finally it was purchased by a man named Jordy Carlton, who was also a BAHCC member, and who in partnership with Owen Owens owned a wonderful old place on College Avenue in Oakland known as "The Garage".

The Garage was fixed up with great flair and was used to house both of their personal collections of antique cars, fire trucks, wooden boats, bone shaker bicycles, clocks, signs, and all sorts of other interesting old stuff, and the place was the scene of many casual parties and fancy social events. A few of our long-time members will remember them well. Perhaps Esther and others can elaborate at one of our meetings.

Jordy and Owen would hire various mechanics to work on their projects. Something was always going on at the Garage, and there were lots of cronies around. The Cadillac, however, wasn't really restored by any of them, but was worked on enough and was painted and upholstered such that it could be used on various Bay Area Tours during the late '60s. It should be noted that one of the good things that Jordy did was to have a 1914 Cadillac rear end put into the car. In 1914 a single year rear end was used on Cadillac's that was a two speed, the equivalent of an overdrive.

In 1970 Jordy, widely considered a Bay Area playboy, had finally married, and he and his new bride went with about two other couples on a charter boat

vacation in the Gulf of Mexico. When they didn't return on schedule, various relatives and friends went to Mexico and precipitated an investigation as best they could. The boat was found burned to the waterline and some clothes and other debris were found, but the crew and the passengers were never accounted for. Many believed it was the result of piracy, but some guessed it was an accident, such as a fire in the galley. This mystery was never solved.

Jordy and his wife had no children, and a nephew inherited his estate, including his collection. There was talk of creating a museum, something Jordy had stated in his trust, but this was seen as impractical and the trust was broken. Bud Lundell and another old car guy of the era, Bill Cross, had been very good friends of Jordy and had been very helpful to Jordy's nephew, so each of them was given first right of refusal to purchase the car of their choice at the appraised value prior to the auction. Bud bought the 1913 Cadillac, and Bill Cross bought the 1905 Cadillac (that being another article some time).

So I bought the car from Bud in 1978 and started fixing it up and having things done to it little by little. You know how that goes; after many years and more than a few dollars, it was finally restored. Carolee and I have used it on numerous BAHCC and national tours and also in two of our children's weddings.

WHERE IS IT NOW?

Unless you've been to our garage in the not-too-distant past, you probably haven't seen it in about five years now. But it is in there, waiting patiently to have a cracked head repaired or replaced, and hopefully it will venture back out on the road before too much longer.
