BAKERSFIELD SWAP MEET AND TOUR

The Kissel's participated in the Bakersfield events in April along with some other folks from the BAHCC, the Brommer's, Azevedo's, and the Johnson's. Here are some words and photos from the weekend from Lynn Kissel.

Annie (our 1914 Kissel), Jeanne and I participated on the tour on Thu (4/14). We shared our back seat with a couple from Michigan who were at Bakersfield without a car.



The tour was split into two separate parts, a "small-car tour" that went a shorter distance to the Bakersfield "Bug Zoo", and a "large-car tour" that drove from Bakersfield to the Wind Wolves Preserve, owned and maintained by the Wildland's Conservency. (I heard various estimates of 80-100 miles, round trip, for the large-car tour.)

The two tours were less characterized by the size of the cars that participated, and more by the distance that they covered. Annie, Jeanne and I went on the large-car tour. (So did a 1903 Curved-Dash Olds!)



Once on the Wind Wolves Preserve, the tour route took us on about 25 miles of old dirt road. We were told that this was originally the main north-south route running through the eastern side of California. (El Camino Real was the western north-south route.)

I estimate that we had about 20-30 cars on the largecar tour. (I don't know how many went on the small-car tour.) The tour spread out once we were on the dirt roads (to avoid "eating" each others dust) and the line of cars seemed to stretch for about two miles or more.

On our trip to Bakersfield, I told Jeanne that Annie was in the best shape and the cleanest that she had ever been since we owned her. That was not to last. We had a couple of stream and gully crossings that were quite exciting. Annie and the other old cars all dipped their tires in water and mud. We raised a great deal of dust and completely covered the lower portions of the body and suspension with it. Two weeks after the tour, I still haven't cleaned all the dust off the car. Still, I guessed that these roads were probably as good or better than many that our 1914 faced when she was young.







The Wind Wolves Preserve is the largest non-profit preserve on the west coast. The elevation climbs as high as 6,000 feet. Although our tour did not take us that high, we were still afforded spectacular open vistas.

We traveled on the preserve to a house reportedly used in the filming of the 1985 movie "Return to Oz", an apparently largely forgettable effort.

We setup there to look for the Tule elk that had been reintroduced into the preserve, but none were to be seen.

We enjoyed a catered lunch at a thoroughly delightful picnic area that featured a large stone pavilion and picnic tables with a commanding overview of the valley.

At the swap meet, I was pleased to see a number of BAHCC members including Joyce and Don Azevedo, Kaaren and Bill Brommer, Mark Cerruti, Don Johnson -- I think Whitney Haist was there, but I somehow didn't run into him.

I was particularly excited to meet what seemed like an unusual number of fellow Kissel owners: Glenn and Shirley Slack (OR, 1915 Touring); Joe and Isabelle Leaf (WA, 1922 Touring, 1922 Speedster, 1923 Phaeton); Sheldon Donig (CA, 1925 Speedster); Vic and Linda Groah (CA, 1912 Semi Touring); Jim Leir (Canada, 1913 Semi Racer). Glenn is one of the organizers of the 2011 HCCA Portland National Tour (July 26-30).

I don't think our kids know what an apron is.

The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath because she only had a few. It was also because it was easier to wash aprons than dresses and aprons used less material. But along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven. It was wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion was even used for cleaning out dirty ears

From the chicken coop, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven.

When company came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids..

And when the weather was cold Grandma wrapped it around her arms.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove. Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron.

From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls.

In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.

When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men folk knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that 'old-time apron' that served so many purposes.

Share this to those who would know (and love) the story about Grandma's aprons. REMEMBER:

Grandma used to set her hot baked apple pies on the window sill to cool. Her granddaughters set theirs on the window sill to thaw.

They would go crazy now trying to figure out how many germs were on that apron. I don't think I ever caught anything from an apron - but love...





We hope you are all signed up for the Bay Area Tour on May 12-15, 2011.



I was CPR certified and instructed search and rescue, building inspection and the management of medical field facilities. Great people and a very rewarding experience.

Currently my focus is directed towards my family and our five wonderful, talented, energetic grandchildren. Their activities and interests keep me interested and laughing - like rocketry, fashion merchandising, scouting, space exploration, 4-H animals (dogs, cats, horses, chickens and a pot bellied pig named Nardo {that thinks he's a dog}!
