Presidents Message



Words that we find offensive now were very prevelent in early newspaper writting. I wonder what these early journalists would think our our modern dancing.

Can any one explain how it is that ordinarily inoffensive young Englishmen, when they dance, suddenly develop the spasmodic automatism of the colored coon conbined with the suppressed fury of the Paris Apache?

How much longer, may we ask are our daughters and sisters to be trundled about like wardrobes, their arms worked incessantly like the parish pump, made to slide about sideways like ungainly crustaceans, and submitted to "Bunny Hugs" and other exotic abominations, which make them look as supremely foolish and vulgar as they can be made to look? (We hestitate to ask why girls permit it, lest the terrible answer should come that they like it. That we refuse to listen to) If it MUST continue, for goodness sake don't let us call it dancing; let's have Isolation Camps for them, and be done with it.

"Chasing the Sun" Convention and Tour Sierra Vista, Arizona 2014

What? You missed the HCCA annual convention and tour "Chasing the Sun" in Sierra Vista, AZ? What a shame! It was a great event with miles and miles of open, lightly traveled roads, very few stoplights, the usual yummy food, interesting destinations, daytime temperatures in the 70s and 80s and a chance to

see old friends and make new ones. There were about 100 members in attendance with 27 horseless carriages ready for touring.
Attending from the Bay Area and Santa Clara Valley Regions were John and Carolee Morrison, Tony Wollesen, Donna Jones and Jim and Jean Boyden.

Sierra Vista is in southeast Arizona, not too far from the Mexican border, and is close to several historic sites. Sunday was for



registration, followed by an easy 36 mile round trip tour to Coronado National Monument which celebrated Spanish Explorer Coronado's visit to the region in 1540. A last minute barbecue was added to the agenda although the evening was a mite cool.

Monday was sunny and a little cool first thing in the morning. (Insert this description at the beginning of each day.) Kartchner Caverns was the destination for the day, although as usual there was a little extra touring to make up an 85 mile day. The natural caverns are carved out of limestone and are very spectacular as well as being warm and humid. They were discovered in 1974, then purchased by the state and opened to the public in the 1990s. En route we visited Fairbank, a ghost town which was once a center for railroad operations in southeastern Arizona. We were directed to all be on time for a photo shoot near a windmill just past Fairbank. But, when we arrived and were assembled, we were suddenly set upon by a gang of outlaws! They recruited two women from the crowd (that was why Bill Carpenter, the tour chairman, needed two extra seats in a car that morning) who were dressed as women of the period. The good guys, including our own Sheriff Bill, confronted the gang and there was a very loud shootout, resulting in the bad guys eating lead and the good guys saving us all. Back at the motel the opening banquet featured lots of authentic Mexican food. Bisbee was the destination for Tuesday with a tour of the Queen Mine, one of the largest copper mines in the world. The tours were led by miners who had worked in the mine before it closed in the 1970s. Instead of the usual mine cars, we had to straddle a padded bench to fit through the narrow passageways. In fact, our first stop was about 15 feet into the mine to allow those who were prone to claustrophobia to change their minds about continuing—there were several takers who were escorted back out. The guides gave good descriptions of how the work was done and as always we came away well aware of what dangerous work that was. The tour was 75 miles so we were back in good time to kick tires and attend the National Board meeting. The new officers elected are Bill Carpenter, president; Karl Darby, vice-president; Carl Pate, secretary; and Chris Paulsen, the Board's youngest member, treasurer. It was also announced that the club just learned it had been left a 1907 Cadillac. There will be much discussion, I'm sure, on just what do with it. We were impressed that Karl Darby and his wife had trailered their Mercer raceabout from their home in New Jersey to Sierra Vista in just three days.

Tombstone, one of the last wide-open frontier boomtowns in the Old West (140 saloons), was Wednesday's destination. During the town's prosperity from about 1877 to 1890 its mines produced well over \$40 million in silver, the largest productive silver district in Arizona. Today it is a tourist attraction—think









Gunfight at the OK Corral. There are at least three or four different stages for shootouts, some purporting to be true to the original Gunfight, others typical of bar scenes and some just for laughs. A silver mine tour was another option as were stagecoach rides and strolling up and down to visit the Courthouse museum, art galleries, souvenir shops and restaurants. With only 52 miles to go we had plenty of time for everything.

Thursday was the most challenging day of touring. The round trip to Tubac was 158 miles with little to see besides changing elevation and landscape along the way. One of the cars lost a wheel, fortunately in the town providing a coffee stop rather than on the highway. No one was hurt but it was scary for the riders and the car finished the day in the trouble trailer (driven by Bebop). Our 1913 Oakland dropped its drive shaft on an off ramp after six small bolts worked their way out of the drive flange but miraculously the driver of one of the tour cars right behind us had just the right size bolts with him and we were soon back on our way. Friday was a different day in that we mostly stayed around the motel. A car show that had been advertised to the community was the focus of the day and several hundred locals came to see the lovely cars. Six cars went to visit a local school attended by students from K through 12th grade; the kids were invited to look at and sit in the cars and one lucky 17 year old who had received his learner's permit the day before learned to drive a Model T. Speaking of learning to drive, Kathie Conrad (HCCA Board member) and Nancy Wall of Massachusetts, both of whom had articles in the last Horseless Carriage Gazette, gave a seminar on the parts of a Model T and driving lessons, respectively. Nancy was an excellent calm instructor who taught all of the half dozen women there, including your reporter, how to drive around the smallish parking lot, using the Ottemanns' 1911 Ford Touring. We even were given a test at the end. Sample question: What does the magneto do? A. It kills mosquitoes that get in the car; B. It makes electricity; C. It amplifies the navigator's directions; D. It tells me what direction we're going. An extra attraction was learning to drive John Meyer's 1906 Reo and he was also patient and calm, unlike some husbands I've had lessons from. I think some of the men wished they had come to the class. And as always when there are cars around, a few spectators came over and begged rides.

If this wasn't enough, there were also seminars having to do with antique hats and the role of the Model T in World War I. For those still bored there were directions to several sites around the town to tour on your own. Friday night was the closing banquet, again served in the motel's large meeting room. Awards were made to Muriel Lundquist for the Bay Area Gaslight Gazette and Allen Greenberg for the Santa Clara Valley Region's web site. The highlight was the announcement of the recipient of the Marion Welch Award: It went to our own John Morrison of the Bay Area HCCA. Of course, there were all the good-bys to HCCA friends from all across the country and even a few from Canada.

The next Convention (and maybe a tour) will be arranged by Vice President Karl Darby at a location to be announced later. These events are great fun and serve to hold the HCCA together as a national organization. We hope to attend and hope to see you there as well. Jean and Jim Boyden








