Report on the Western Gaslight 1 and 2 cylinder tour a couple of weeks ago based in Oakdale, CA

I have to apologize for not having photos to add but hope you will enjoy reading about this fun tour. Don and Lillian Ritchey offered to chair this year's W. G. 1 and 2 cylinder tour, and Doug and Susan Durein volunteered to be co-chairs. The Western Gaslight has only one tour per year, usually in April or May, and it has been in existence since 1994. In the earlier years our tours used to average thirty plus cars, but in recent years, as members have gotten older, the numbers have dwindled into the low twenties. But because the Ritcheys and the Dureins are well known for putting on excellent tours, this year we were back up to 34 cars.

If you've never been on a 1 and 2 cylinder tour, you should hear what it sounds like in the morning when people start cranking them up. They all sound different and make some really interesting and unique sounding noises. It definitely brings you back to an earlier time than even we are used to.

Most of the cars were Buicks, followed by Reos, Maxwells, two curved dash Oldsmobiles, a Brush, an IHC, a magnificent 1903 Winton, and a beautiful big 30 horse power Stanley Steamer. In addition to the folks mentioned above, some of the other participants' names you will probably recognize are the Beaumonts, Bennets, Caldeiras, Donna Jones, Tony Wollesen, the Lagorios, Jerry Neil, the Ottemanns, and Norm Schwartz and his daughter, Julia.

We stayed in a very comfortable, yet reasonable motel in Oakdale, drove through about 40-plus miles per day of beautiful and virtually empty backroads, had great food, an afternoon parking lot bar, visited several interesting destinations along the way (Don and Lillian's shop/museum, a family automotive shop with work in progress on several old cars, a park in Knight's Ferry and another park with a catered lunch at River's Edge in Escalon, a cowboy restaurant and cowboy museum, had an indoor/outdoor hospitality room every evening, and the highlight of a finale banquet at a beautiful golf course nearby where the old cars were parked on the lawn all around the big fancy tent that was our eating area). Passerby golfers were quite intrigued and stopped to ask various questions about the primitive cars.

It was very aptly named "The Reunion Tour" because the attendance was up, and we saw many old friends there whom we hadn't seen in a while.

Carolee and I served as trouble truck drivers and helped bring in 4 cars, two of which got back on the road for the rest of the tour and two of which had trickier repairs needing to be made back home. Since Carolee and I were in the pick-up truck and there was only room for one additional passenger, Jerry Neil agreed to help out by following us in his big Mitchell and transporting the other passengers needing a lift.

Several tour participants enjoyed an Italian dinner together on Saturday evening, while others dined elsewhere and some returned home for the evening.

Sunday morning started with a coffee and donut stop at the home of George (age 96) and Fran Sherman who have been members of the Horseless Carriage club for approximately 60 years. Members were able to inspect their collection of early cars and home full of precious antiques. George presented David Pava with a large Horseless Carriage Club Banner which will be used at future events. That gift was most appreciated and will be put to good use. Thank you George and Fran!

We then traveled to Hooverville Orchards where tourists were able to purchase fresh fruit and homemade bakery goods. The tour concluded with a catered barbecue lunch at Gold Bug Mine in Placerville.


Approximately 135 miles were driven over two days and there were no significant mechanical problems. A list of participants and cars driven is attached.
