
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Goodyear Gets Big Shipment of Rubber

The first shipment by any rubber manufacturer of crude rubber from the Far East since the embargo was laid by England, was received January 22 by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, Akron, O. A train load, consisting of 500 tons of the product in 23 cars, arrived on that day. The Goodyear Company also has 500 tons on board the Lusitania, due in a few days, and this will be the second receipted shipment since England lifted the embargo.(Ed. Note: The Lusitania was sunk on Friday, May 7, 1915.)

Automobiles in South Dakota

The automobile registration for South Dakota for 1914 showed a material increase over that of 1913. The total number of Owner's licenses was 20,929, compared with 14,452 in 1913; the number of dealer's licenses were 491 last year, compared with 298 for the previous year, and the motorcycle licenses increased from 1212 in 1913 to 1733 in 1914.

Goodrich Making Millimeters

The B. F. Goodrich Company, Akron, O. has imported a millimeter mold and is making millimeter solid tires. This action was taken in order to help out its plant in Columbus, France, as 350 of the employees of this company under 45 years of age have gone to war.

Hudson Sales \$7,500,000

For the five months period ending Dec, 1 1914, the Hudson Motor Car Company, Detroit, Mich., made a sales record of \$7,500,000, according to statements issued by the company. This amount compares with \$3,000,000 in the corresponding period of 1913. There are now 10,000 Hudsons of the light six type in use in 43 different countries.

Asks Aid For Soldiers

The Touring Club de France, through Leon Auscher, has appealed to Americans for financial assistance. The club has formed a committee for soldiers and has devised a gift package. This package costs 10 francs and contains a water proof garment, trench shoes, a map of the scene of operation, tobacco, pipes, cigarettes, etc. It is for the purpose of these packages that the club solicits money.

Want 15-Minute Law Changed

The present rule that limits the time that a car may stand in Main Street, Worchester, Mass., to 15 minutes is being hotly contested in an endeavor to obtain modification by the automobile interests of the city. The chamber of commerce has joined in the fight and it is believed probable that a 30-minute rule will be substituted.

REO's 1914 Profits \$2,539,187

For the 14 months ending Oct. 31, 1914, consisting of the company's fiscal year, the REO Motor Car Company, Lansing, Mich., reports a net profit of \$2,539,187. The extra two months are included owing to the change of the fiscal year from August to October. The company's assets now total \$5,120,782, and a surplus on hand of \$1,692,082 is shown in the latest report.

Price of Gas Reduced

The Standard Oil Company of New Jersey has announced a reduction of one cent a gallon in the whole sale price of gasoline. The price is now 13 ½ cents a gallon and kerosene at eight.

Pope Plant Finally Sold

The main plant of the Pope Manufacturing Company, Hartford, Conn., has been sold to the Pratt & Whitney Company, that city. A certified check of \$300,000 was turned over to the receiver, the court passed on the sale and the deed was immediately transferred. The new plant, which will employ 600 men, will be used to complete the Pratt & Whitney Company's \$2,000,000 contract with the Chinese government for armory and arsenal machinery.







Dorothy Levitt-The Fastest Girl on Earth

Back in the time when cars were in their infancy, drivers, especially lady drivers, were few and far between. A driver needed brains and brawn to drive those beasts and hold them on what was called a road but was in reality, just a wagon trail. Men drove and women rode along.... that was the norm. That is, until Dorothy Levitt came along. Dorothy Levitt was described as a "beautiful secretary with long legs and eyes like pools". She was an accomplished equestrian, even participating in steeplechase events. While working as a secretary at the Napier & Son works in Lambeth, England she somehow met Selwyn Edge who was into building racing cars. Since they both seemed to like to be in the public eye, she agreed to compete as a racecar driver. Some speculate that Edge wanted a woman driver because he was pushing that his racecar was something that "even women could manage driving it". By hiring Ms. Levitt as his personal assistant, he could gain some publicity for the company and it wasn't long before her career in motoring took off as she learned to drive, then, racecars. Edge encouraged her to make automobile driving her career and even arranged for her to do a six -month apprenticeship to a French automobile maker. There she learned all aspects of building and driving cars and upon her return to London, she began teaching women how to drive. Some of her students included Queen Alexandra, the Royal Princesses (Louise, Victoria and Maud) and other ladies of nobility. She also taught American female tourists.

In 1903, she became one of the first women to race. Some believed her driving was just a publicity stunt, but she was serious about her newfound talents and the fact that she won many races kept her on the road. She also raced boats, learned how to fly planes and also kept riding her horses. She once said managing a car was easier than wrangling a horse. Her race career continued on for many years until her health began to fail.

In the beginning women who drove were almost expected to dress like men, act like men and be as masculine as they could. Most women wore the garments of the men and kept their faces and ears covered. Their leather coats were masculine in design and sometimes no one knew they were with a woman driver until the woman spoke, giving away her gender. Such is not the case with Levitt. She raced in flattering, feminine clothes with coordinating hats and veils. She designed a lightweight coat of her own design and her blue motoring coat was the pre-curser to the very popular duster that protected women's clothing.

Despite her feminine demeanor and attire, she was a tough cookie on the racecourse. She had a reputation of being fast and was called "a scorcher" which was the name given to those who delighted in exceeding the speed limit and evading the police. She often got in trouble with the law when she drove the streets of London as if she were still on a race.

In 1904, Dorothy won two medals at the Southport Speed Trials in Blackpool, driving a 50 house-power Napier racecar. The publisher of her book, "The Woman and The Car" reproduced in 2014, included some excerpts from her diary as a part of its introduction. These diary entries included details of her automobile races, the prizes she won and personal comments such as "will do better next time." In a 1906 interview, she said she love auto racing and balanced her need for speed with quiet time trout fishing. She was a woman of diverse interests and talents. She loved to play poker and vowed to one day "break the bank" at Monte Carlo.

We would all like to have met her and known her but she died in 1922 at the age of 40. However, she wrote a book called *The Woman and The Car: A Chatty Little Handbook for All Women Who Motor or Want to Motor.* Throughout her book, she encourages women drivers to believe in themselves as they have

the intelligence and understanding to drive as well as repair their own cars. At the time her book was published, (1909) women were legally second-class citizens so she was way ahead of her time.



Below are some of her top tips:

Don't be afraid of your car

Dress well (and don't be afraid to be feminine)

Stock your glove compartment (which you'll find under the seat) and besides the hair pins, handkerchief and clean gloves, don't forget some chocolate would be nice)

Keep a hand mirror close to you as you may wish to look behind you while driving. (The rear view mirror, patented in 1914) probably came from her idea

Whilst driving, always keep a cool head

Never for a second, allow your memory to lapse

Always regard pedestrians, whether makes, females or infants as uncertain in their possible actions.

Never take it for granted that the other driver will certainly do the right thing.

Never allow yourself to get flurried in the face of danger and remember that your coolness may save the situation

Never to anything that will prompt you to say you did not dream that such a thing might happen.

You can fix your own car

Don't forget your gun. Levitt recommended an automatic Colt Always let your clutch in gently-thus you will keep your tyre bills down and

Never give the impression you are lolling behind the wheel.



Approval of the Minutes of the board meeting of January 18, 2017—These minutes had been mailed out in advance of tonight's meeting and had already been read by the board members.
