
couldn't resist this one with the Yosemite connection. Cross your fingers.

Possible light showers were forecast in the greater Livermore area as the tour date of Saturday, March 10th approached, but that didn't dampen the spirits of those who brought out a beautiful selection of antique cars. Johnny Crowell and his daughter, along with passengers Pat Kelly and Jon Alff, easily fit into Johnny's big, beautiful 1915 Simplex Touring, Paul Chapot brought his 1912 Overland Touring and offered Mark Cerruti and Gerald Robinson rides, Tony Wollesen drove his watertight 1933 Chevrolet sedan all the way from San Jose for the event, Brian Harlamoff and his friend Jon Eugenio arrived in Brian's shiny 1913 Model T roadster, Bill Hund and Mary Mendes showed up in Bill's trusty 1914 Model T Roadster, and Tour Chairs Don and Joyce Azevedo brought their ever-faithful 1914 Model T Touring and offered Bill and Kaaren Brommer rides.



Further dressing up our caravan were three gorgeous cars from the local Classic Car Club, several members of which had been invited to join us for the ride. They included Bob and William Reed ('37 Packard Sedan), George Teebay in his 1934 Pierce Silver Arrow Coupe, and Steve Marini and Steve Natale in the former's flawless 1933 Cadillac Convertible Sedan, one of the last two examples left of this model.

Others needing to leave early brought modern cars (the Dureins, the Harleys and John Morrison).

After visiting, tire kicking and enjoying treats, we left the parking lot a little after 10:00, making our way westward and turning left onto one of our favorite touring routes, Mines Rd.





From this point on, it is about 35 or forty miles of journeying up, up, up a long, winding and very picturesque country road.



Quite a ways up the mountain, a couple of the predicted rain showers briefly dribbled, so every once in a while you would pass an antique pulled over for a quick putting up of the top.

Our lunch place was a quaint little burger café at the top, and everyone enjoyed an absolutely traffic-free run up to it without any car breakdowns.

She began to quietly regale us with stories from her youth growing up in a privileged family in Oakland, her days at UC Berkeley, working for Bernard Maybeck before heading to Paris and finally being accepted and then graduating as the first woman in architecture from the famed Ecole des Beaux-Arts.


She then went on to tell us about her extraordinary work history in San Francisco and the Bay Area before, with the use of wonderful photos provided by the Piedmont Historical Society, showing us the homes she built in Piedmont and telling us of some of the clients who came to her for these beautiful homes (which will again be viewed on the tour after the Piedmont Fourth of July parade).

It was clear to all our members having the pleasure of Julia's extraordinary visit and who may not have known much about Julia that she was not only an acclaimed architect, but also an amazing and prolific business woman who dedicated her life to her craft.

Subject: The Goldberg Brothers


Here's a little fact for Automotive Buffs, . . or just to dazzle your friends.

The four Goldberg Brothers, Lowell, Norman, Hiram, and Max, invented and developed the first automobile air-conditioner. On July 17, 1946, the temperature in Detroit was 97 degrees. The four brothers walked into old man Henry Ford's office and sweet-talked his secretary into telling him that four gentlemen were there with the most exciting innovation in the Auto Industry since the electric starter. Henry was curious and invited them into his office. They refused and instead asked that he come out to the parking lot to their car. They persuaded him to get into the car, which was about 130 degrees, turned on the air conditioner, and cooled the car off immediately. The old man got very excited and invited them back to the office, where he offered them \$3 million for the patent. The brothers refused, saying they would settle for \$2 million, but they wanted the recognition by having a label, 'The Goldberg Air-Conditioner,' on the dashboard of each car in which it was installed. Now old man Ford was more than just a little anti-Jewish, and there was no way he was going to put the Goldberg's name on two million Fords. They haggled back and forth for about two hours and finally agreed on \$4 million and that just their first names would be shown.

And so to this day, all Ford air conditioners show - Lo, Norm, Hi, and Max -- on the controls.

- 2018 HCCA Merchandise In addition to being able to order HCCA merchandise on the web from Brothers Grafix, a team of members worked hard to improve inventory and to get merchandise to six events in 2017. The team members were Jay/Carol Simpson (east) and Keene/Christine Brewer (West) and Sharon Gooding (West). Merchandise sales from the 6 events during the year were \$2,840. They have been working hard to improve the quality and availability of HCCA merchandise for members
- Century Plaque Data In 2013, the Century Plaque program was posted on the HCCA web site. The data base included honored cars during the first ten years (2003 to 2013). At the end of 2017, the information on the vehicles receiving plaques from 2014 to 2017 were gathered and formatted so that they can be added to the data base in the near future.
- Club Documents For cost reasons, it has been decided that the digital club documents will not be stored on the web site. They will be placed on a SanDisk flash drive for use by the president and the HCCA office.
- 2018 HCCA Roster Committee and Directors are still working on the project. There have been issues with resources to work on the project and the lack of updated information from members who have moved, sold or bought cars. More updates should be learned at the annual meeting.
- New HCCA National News Editor With board retirement of Carl Pate from the Board of Directors this year, the new editor of the HCCA National News will be Jay Simpson of MD. He has been given the editor guidelines and is getting help from Carl during the transition. Remember this document was designed to inform members of items as they happen. It belongs to the members and not the Board of Directors.

Pikes Peak International Car Hill Climb, The young guy from Kansas who built his own racing car, Spencer Penrose and the Broadmoor Hotel at Colorado Springs, The car and horse and horseless carriage car museum at the Broadmoor car garage.

Spencer Penrose came from a wealthy Chicago family. He was in Colorado on a hunting trip and fell in love of the area. They camped out in a large area by Pikes Peak. He visioned a large Grand Hotel and called it THE BROADMOOR. Which relates to the grassy field.

It also came with part of the Cheyenne Mountain that is part of Pikes Peak. Always looking for something new to do. He in visioned a wider road up up the Mountain an part way and run a car timed race. It is now paved all the way.

All the big car manufactures were invited to race to show there cars. The first race was in 1916. This would give them bragging rights.

A young fellow from a farm in Kansas in the 50's hand built a racing car over two years and then drove it to Colorado Springs. Paid the entry fee (he had no backers). Entered the race. On his first run he beat the other big company's cars time.. They all disputed his timing. So the judges had him run another time and he did better beating his own time.

Penrose bought the car at twice the cost to build and gave him a first class train ticket to go home.


As a teen I and my buddy's went to see the racers twice.





BAHCC 2/21/18 BOARD MINUTES

The meeting was held at the home of Ed and Carolyn Harley in Danville, CA.

- 1. Call to Order—V. P. Ed Harley called the meeting to order at 7:28 p.m., explaining that President Ed Archer was absent because of an unavoidable conflict.
- 2. Membership—Whitney Haist said he had received an email from a perspective member from Stockton named Dino Falconi. Whitney had filled him in about membership, and Dino had followed up by sending in his dues check and application. He has no national HCCA number yet nor a pre-'16 car yet, but is interested. Don Azevedo moved that his membership be accepted pending our receipt of his HCCA national number. Mark Cerruti seconded, and the motion was passed unanimously. Ed Harley asked about Mike Barricks's being interested in becoming a member. Don Azevedo said he is in the process of getting the necessary paperwork to Mike.
- 3. Treasurer's Report—Treasurer Whitney Haist said collecting dues is the main activity at this time. Currently there are 46 memberships paid, and there are quite a few more that aren't paid up as yet. He also reportedly that he has filed the annual state and federal tax forms required.
- 4. Approval of Minutes—As yet unapproved minutes from the January 17 board meeting were emailed to all board members prior to tonight's meeting and no one had suggestions for corrections or additions. Don Azevedo moved for approval of the minutes as printed, Johnny Crowell seconded, and the motion was approved unanimously.
- 5. Tour Chair's Report—Johnny Crowell said he has a Green Brass Tour flyer made up and has sent it to Mark Cerruti for inclusion in the Gaslight Gazette. Johnny also sent copies to a couple of other groups that might be interested as well as to some individuals. He brought up the question as to how many of our members did we think could potentially go on the Green Brass Tour (ie. how many have one or more running cars, a trailer if necessary, etc.) He added that he has a couple of extra trailers (one open, one enclosed) and that he could potentially loan one or both to members if such help would be wanted, the idea being to encourage more members to bring their cars out on tours. Don Azevedo said he will send out reminder emails for the Green Brass tour.

Ed Harley mentioned we won't be doing another charity drive this year at a Cars and Coffee event at Blackhawk, in that last year's was a lot of work with only a moderately successful result of about \$1,200. Ed added that there will be a Cars and Coffee event and tour/lunch on our calendar some time later this year, one that will be just for fun.

6. Nuts and Bolts—Whitney suggested we might consider setting up a Nuts and Bolts visit to the shop of George Smith, the man right next to Norman and Adria's museum in Martinez. He is currently working on the restoration of a 1913 White Trick. Ed Harley suggested Whitney contact Doug with the idea. Whitney also suggested considering a welding demonstration by someone he knows named Bertolotti. (Note: This is not our friend John Bertolotti that we already know.)

7. Club Calendars—Regarding one of our a philanthropic events, we try annually to gather up gifts for Children's Hospital at the July Fourth event in the Morrisons' backyard. A discussion occurred about possible ways this might be made more successful. Some of the ideas were to publicize it more, to request one gift per person rather than per couple or party, to have an attractive sign displayed and a prominent table with attractive boxes for folks to leave their gifts in, and perhaps another sign and collection container in which to leave checks made payable to BAHCC (or cash) for folks who may have forgotten to bring such gifts. Any such checks or cash will then be used by one of our club volunteers to buy more gifts before we take the stash of gifts over to the hospital.

Ed Harley mentioned the upcoming March 7 Club Meeting, after which there will be entertainment provided by a very interesting impersonator of Julia Morgan, one of the most famous early 20th Century architects of the Bay Area and beyond.

It was also mentioned that we should promote our upcoming April Pot Luck and Auction by advertising more and asking folks to bring much better things, and suggesting that people can set a reserve sort of price that will go to the donor, with the rest going to the club. It was also suggested that folks be encouraged to offer things like dinners for four of six or whatever, apple or other types of pies, homemade brownies or candy, quilting or whatever, in lieu of some of the type of old car parts or bric-a-brac or books or magazines that usually aren't really wanted by any of our buyers.

8. Old Business— Don Azevedo reported he and Joyce had visited the Sharpsteen Museum in Calistoga again recently and reminded us about the idea of our club having a tour and lunch event there and at the same time creating a 6 month display there, telling and showing guests about our hobby. They continue to be interested in our doing this, and they have assured us that they have a very impressive insurance policy that would adequately cover our items during the six month period. The room involved is a good size and has a number of various sizes of display cabinets. The display would start this coming November and go for 6 months (through May). Don thinks we should consider committing some club funds to cover some of the costs of this endeavor, and he was asked to be thinking of specifics to recommend at a future meeting.

Don also showed us three different club related Jackets he has, and we discussed having new ones made specifically for the BAHCC. John had checked with Phyllis Pottle since our January meeting and their family is willing to do them for us. After discussion, we decided such jackets would be like the present "canvassy" blue HCCA jackets that many of us have, but would have a large, specifically BAHCC patch on the back and our first name on the front. John agreed to phone Phyllis again with this information so her family can work up a price per jacket.

- 9. Gaslight Gazette—Mark Cerruti asked if anyone was doing a report on the Alameda Valentine's Day Lunch and Tour. John volunteered to look into it.
- 10. Next Meeting—March 21st, John and Carolee's house, 7:30 p.m., parking in back yard (enter through the long driveway of 11 Arbor Drive, Piedmont and turn left at end).

BAHCC MINUTES OF March 7, 2018 MEETING

- In President Ed Archer's absence, Vice President Ed Harley called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. (Ed Archer was in Hawaii.) Ed introduced and welcomed three guests, Jon Eugenio, Cynthia Gorman, and Gail Lombardi.
- 2. Kudos—Ed thanked Treasurer Whitney Haist, Secretary John Morrison, and Editor Mark Cerruti for the work they do behind the scenes. Don Johnson added that he had seen in the latest National Newsletter that Mark Cerruti had been awarded "Highest Honors" by the National Board for his work as editor of this last year's Gaslight Gazette. (Mark was then given an enthusiastic round of applause.)
- 3. Ed asked if there were any corrections or additions to the February, 2018 general meeting minutes as printed in the March Gaslight Gazette. There being none suggested, Don Azevedo moved for approval of the minutes as printed. Kaaren Brommer seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.
- 4. Whitney reported he had received information from Bill Schrambling's son that the family is planning a memorial service for Bill on Sunday, May 6 at 3:00 p.m. at the Pleasant Hill Community Center, 320 Civic Dr., Pleasant Hill. It has a large parking lot, but the family would love it if the old cars could be parked around the circular section up close. Kaaren Brommer suggested this request go into the next Gaslight Gazette (article deadline 3/23).
- 5. Membership Report—Don Azevedo announced that the Board at its last meeting had approved the membership application of Dino Falconi, pending receipt of his HCCA national membership number. Don also reported he has received another membership application which is from one of tonight's guests, Jon Eugenio, and that happily it appears we will soon have two new club members.

Tour Report—Don Azevedo supplied the details of the Green Brass Tour, which will start this coming Saturday morning at Robert Livermore Park, Livermore and will go out and come back on Mines Rd. (about 25 miles each way). There will be a lunch stop at the half way point at an enjoyable "biker café" we have used in the past.

- 6. Johnny Crowell mentioned that the board has been considering the fact that when we have too many tours and too frequent activities, participation tends to dwindle, and that the board is now planning to have less overall frequency of activities in an effort to increase participation in the ones we do have. The result is that there will likely be no more than 6 touring activities this year, so he hopes as many members as possible will make the effort to participate in this coming Saturday's Green Brass Tour. This year the start time for the Green Brass Tour will be 10:00 a.m. in an effort to make it more convenient for folks who have to travel longer distances to get to the starting point.
- 7. Ed mentioned the upcoming Blackhawk Cars and Coffee event and our follow-up tour May 6. After we leave Blackhawk we will take a relatively short tour and end up at the old schoolhouse for lunch (4th annual there), then on to Bill Schrambling's memorial service in Pleasant Hill at 3:00.
- 8. Brian Harlamoff reported on and invited the BAHCC to participate in a Santa Cruz HCC sponsored swap meet which is planned for Saturday, April 7, \$15 for a seller's booth and free to buyers. It is a fundraiser to help with a local church sponsored troubled youth program. The program is automotive related, and the event takes place at the involved church's parking lot which is actually located in Aptos, CA (below Santa Cruz).
- 9. Kaaren Brommer mentioned the BAHCC April Pot-luck Meeting plus Club Auction to be conducted by Ed Archer and Don Azevedo. She and

others added we need to make some improvements in the auction this year—lessen the tiny items that go for a dollar or two, be more creative in adding items such as offering a dinner for 6 (or whatever number) at your house, offer items such as baked pies, offer some more expensive prices but place a starting price reserve, offer an item and state a minimum price that the seller will receive, and anything over goes to the club, offer art items such as framed paintings, prints or photos, offer an item that the winner can go first at a Blackhawk Cars and Coffee event regardless of the year of the car, etc. "Creativity is the key," was the consensus of how to make the auction a much more fun and more successful event.

- 10. Nuts and Bolts—Doug reported the next available time for a Nuts and Bolts will be in June because of other already scheduled events (Green Brass Tour in March, Bakersfield Swap Meet in April, and the Cars and Coffee/tour/lunch/ Schrambling service in May). Doug has an idea for the June Nuts and Bolts and is already working to finalize the details.
- 11. Sunshine Report—There was a discussion regarding Bill Schrambling's service, and there was a general consensus that providing a floral arrangement for the service would be a positive idea. There was also a discussion of what had been done on such occasions in the past. Charles Ebers mentioned that the club has at times sent a donation to a charitable organization in a member's honor. Johnny Crowell reported that Christine will be having hip surgery soon. John Morrison asked how Eric Lundquist was doing with his treatments, and Don Johnson said that although the treatments have been rough, Eric's attitude continues to be strong and upbeat, and that he is actually feeling stronger and better this week.
- 12. Don Azevedo reported on the fact that the Ben Sharpsteen Museum in Calistoga has invited us through him, Joyce and others, to create a 6month long horseless carriage -related display in one of the main rooms of the museum. Don stated he is excited about this opportunity and has succeeded in getting others excited about it too. Norman, Adria and Julia Schwartz are interested, most if not all of the board members are interested, and the plans are in the making. Such a display would be put up during October and would come down in April. It would not involve putting any of our actual cars on display, but would be more of a display about the cars of the era and about our hobby, with printed information, photographs, and examples of interesting facts and period car parts shown in locked glass cabinets. (They have several nice, large, locked cabinets available for our use.) And we will include information there about the BAHCC itself and how one can join if interested. The hope also is that the display will contain a continuous horseless carriage related video presentation that will stream during all of their open hours. And in the tentative plans, there will also be a BAHCC tour and lunch there for the opening day of the display. Don said he and others will keep providing progress reports on the planning of this project. And yes, he has been assured that the Sharpsteen Museum carries strong insurance to cover our members' things that will be used in the display.
- 13. At 8:14 p.m. the meeting was adjourned to refreshments by Donna Jones and to entertainment by world famous early twentieth century architect, Julia Morgan (amazingly reincarnated).
