




#### **EDITOR'S NOTES:**












#### Brass on the Grass at Hillsborough

Voltage was in the air at this year's, the 62<sup>nd</sup> annual, Hillsborough Concours d'Elegance on July 15, 2018. Norman and Adria Schwartz sparked plenty of interest by displaying their 1905 Studebaker Electric. Currently, there are not many of those seen on the fields of car shows. Norman said the show promotors initially invited him and his Studebaker to be part of tribute to the "clean fuel" automobiles. Much to the chagrin of Nikola Tesla and his followers, all other invitees apparently had dead batteries and failed to accept the offer!




Norman and Adria's Model 13 A, Special High Speed Electric Stanhope. Photo by the Author

As the nineteenth century arrived, the Studebaker Brothers knew the days for their horse drawn carriages were numbered. In 1902 they jumped into the automobile business, not with gasoline autos, but electrics. John Mohler Studebaker, one of the five Studebaker Brothers, especially disliked gasoline powered cars. These, he said, were "clumsy, dangerous, noisy brutes [which] stunk to high heaven, break down at the worst possible moment, and are a public nuisance." Consequently, his firm built electrics exclusively in 1902 and '03, and alongside gasoline cars through 1912. Who knows, maybe Mr. J.M.S. will be proven correct over a century later.

I am afraid to say the car show scene is changing like so many other things in my life. The cars in over half the Judging Classes at this show looked just like the cars that were in the parking lot of my high school when I was a student there! And now they're in the Concours d'Elegance? What can I say?



#### Brass Era Cars Life In The Slow Lane



**Have you heard?** Our club has an opportunity to create an exhibit at the Sharpsteen Museum in Calistoga. Their focus is on local history with exhibits illustrating how life has changed over time. They have asked us to tell the story of vintage travel in the brass era.

The exhibit will run for six months – from early November 2018 to April 2019. We hope to boost curiosity and share excitement about the antique auto hobby.

Five generously sized, locked display cases will be available to us. We'd like to tell a good story, scrapbook-style, with a theme for each case. Can you help us? All we need is the loan of some vintage memorabilia: things relating to travel in the brass car era that reflect folks on the move, newest technology of the day and finding new paths to follow around the turn of the 20th century.

#### Our general themes and wish list items are:

- 1. Defining the era for brass cars and their role in the development of the automobile age. Interesting facts about early technology, the industry or selected companies could be included.
- 2. "Petroliana" or gas station collectibles. Photos, maps, oil cans, tin signs, tools, accessories, gadgets and equipment.
- 3. About the ladies. Spotlight on marketing focused on women, controllers of the household budget and seekers of freedom. We may cite the role of the "Blue Liner," a Packard used by suffragists in the right-to-vote campaign. Travel clothing will be displayed as well.
- 4. Advertising art: posters, postcards souvenirs designed to tantalize the consumer and fuel the travel bug.
- 5. Still fun after all these years: a promotion of club activities, local backroad tours taken, photos of events, examples of restoration projects.

Your display organizers, Adria and Julia Schwartz would appreciate hearing from you so that we can plan for spaces and signage. We will gladly address any questions or concerns. Thanks in advance for your participation.

#### A VISIT TO THE LOUWMAN MUSEUM



While in Holland, I made it a point to visit the Louwman Museum, located in *The Hague*, about an hour from Amsterdam. I had reluctant family & friends in tow, and they were not too enthusiastic about visiting a building full of old cars. But like me, they were very impressed with the building itself, not to mention its contents. The building is less than 10 years old, but the collection is one of the oldest of its kind.

After entering the building buying a ticket, you immediately find yourself in a cavernous long and narrow great hall with intricate arched wood ceiling. This houses temporary exhibit of 7 Mercedes Silver Arrow race cars, on loan from



the Mercedes-Benz Museum in Stuttgart. You then climb aboard an elevator that takes you to the basement, where you'll find the permanent collection, and this is where you begin your self-guided tour.

The exhibits are placed in chronological order, starting with the earliest cars. You make your way through the museum at your own pace, ascending past some 200+ cars. Exhibits include a brief description in English and Dutch. Guided tours are also available. In addition to the automobiles, the museum has an amazing art collection, featuring dozens of posters as well as many other auto related artifacts.

I think the Louwman Museum is spectacular and it is a "museum" in every sense of the word. The displays cover the art & history of the automobile, including every-day transportation, making it not just another collection of "trophy cars." If you should find yourself in Holland, you must add the Louwman Museum to your agenda. You will not be disappointed! Plan at least half a day to see everything. In addition, budget some time to visit The Hague. It's a beautiful old-world city, intermixed with extraordinary modern skyscrapers.

#### BAHCC General Meeting Minutes from August 1, 2018

Call to order—President Ed Archer brought the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. Tony Wollesen introduced upcoming new member George Teebay, long time car collector who has a number of beautiful Pierce Arrows that he has often brought to the Piedmont Fourth of July Parade and the Picnic afterwards. Guest Neil Hildebrand, an old friend of the Lundquists and a docent for years at the annual Hillsborough Concours d'Elegance, was introduced by Eric. Then the grandson of Bernard and Anne Metais, Benoit Marteau, was also introduced by a very proud Bernard. He was born and raised in France like Bernard, and is now a college engineering student there, thus following in Bernard's footsteps.

The BAHCC's upcoming display of antique horseless carriage and club items at the Ben Sharpsteen Museum-Ed Archer reminded us that the timing for us to organize and then put up this display is fast approaching, and he noted that the Schwartz and the Azevedo families have already been hard at work preparing for this exciting project. Julia Schwartz presented some examples of what type of things folks could volunteer to put in the museum's locking glass cabinets (things like motometers, lamps, cast iron cars, BAHCC photos of our tours and other events, before and after restoration project photos)—anything that would help viewers see what our hobby is all about as well as what many of the accessories and components of the of brass era automobiles looked like. Don Azevedo added more ideas of things that could be included by our members, and he noted that all such objects must be able to fit into the glass cases' shelves that are about 18" tall, so in other words, nothing bigger than that can be included in the display. Opening day for our exhibit is Saturday, November 3, so our put-up dates will be the week-end of October 27-28. The exhibit will then stay up until early May. For more information, members were encouraged to contact Norm, Adria, Julia, Don or Joyce. Members are encouraged to bring all your display items you are willing provide for this purpose to the next meeting, and to be sure to bring a complete list of your items and to keep a copy of that list for yourself as well. Ed Harley asked if the use of some Club money might be needed for this project, and Julia mentioned that probably some would-- for such things as cardboard, paper and other such supplies to help decorate the cabinets. It was decided that this item will be covered at the August Board Meeting. Pam Johnson thanked Julia, Don and Joyce for all their and Norm and Adria's time and hard work planning and organizing this event. (followed by a nice round of applause for all of them from the audience.)

Nuts and Bolts—Doug Durein said no one has requested one at this time.

Website—No report.

Newsletter—Editor Mark Cerruti thanked everyone who contributed this month and said the deadline for next month's articles is August 23. Mark was recognized for having received highest possible honors and a trophy from the National HCCA Board for his work on the Bay Area Gaslight Gazette. (A warm round of applause ensued.)

Old Business—Ed Archer reported that member Jon Eugenio had informed him that member Brian Harlamoff would like to have the club tent (the old "office" for the BAHCC's former Swap Meets and which Bill Hund has been kind enough to store for several years.) The tent will now be used as part of the annual Camping Tour that several of our club members help put on. (Although not put on officially by the BAHCC, BAHCC members are invited to attend.)
