

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



On the Cover: SUNSET® February 1907 Artist; Gordon Coutts (1880 - 1937)


AND THE YEAR GOES ON



Should weather be un-cooperative, we will convene indoors at 406 Ward Street, Martinez and picnic among the car collection.



HORSELESS CARRIAGE CONTEST.

AWARD OF THREE THOUSAND DOLLAR PRIZE BY THE JUDGES.

R ECOGNIZING the important part which the new horseless carriage must play in the life of the twentieth century, and the impetus its perfection must give to the building of new roads at the end of the present century, The Cosmopolitan offered a prize of three thousand dollars for the best horseless carriage. The conditions of the contest were specified as follows:

Three thousand dollars will be awarded to motor carriages presenting the greatest number of points of excellence, to be exhibited in a trial trip to be made from the New York office of The Cosmopolitan Magazine, City Hall

Park, to a point near THE COSMOPOLITAN Building at Irvington, and thence back to the starting place. The award will be made upon the following points, the maximum being 100:

Speed, 35
Simplicity of construction and durability, . . 30
Ease in operating and safety, . . 25
Cost, 10





CONCLUSIONS.

"Do the tests made under the auspices of The Cosmopolitan show the horseless carriage in shape for practical, everyday use?" is the question which the reader will ask.

"Yes," and "no," must be the reply. To the person already familiar with machinery, and capable of exercising proper intelligence and care, the horseless carriage stands ready to his hand.

That it is already the complete motor carriage, prepared to meet all the various requirements demanded by the public, must be doubted. That it is making the most rapid strides toward such perfected condition we can not doubt. That horseless carriages will soon be on the market, of qualities and prices suitable for general use, we must believe.

* * *

Going from the realm of fact to that of imagination, the views advanced some months ago in THE COSMOPOLITAN can not be materially modified. The horseless carriage promises, by its cheapness of operation, to give a vehicle which can be brought to the curb-line of the street to receive passengers, at a fare not exceeding five cents. It thus promises to do away with the jerky, overcrowded cable and electric cars, and to substitute a noiseless, smooth and agreeable carriage, over asphalt streets, at the same cost, with the element of danger reduced to a minimum. Its general introduction will probably result in a three-cent car fare, as the first result of competition, and an increase of speed on elevated roads.

The firm to whose carriage was awarded the prize, writes as follows:

DEAR SIR:

We received by special letter your check for three thousand dollars, being the award of the judges of The Cosmo-Politan Horseless Carriage Competition to the Duryea Motor Wagon Company.

When the manufacture of horseless vehicles becomes one of the great businesses of the country, your enterprise in encouraging inventors in such a substantial way will receive the general appreciation that it deserves. The small number of starters in the contest of May 30th, is no criterion of the number of men working in the art. To complete a carriage in all its details involves long study and a constant throwing aside of parts, for something that scems to work better.


We receive numerous inquiries for our motors from inventors who have designed some special steering, speeding, or other gear and wish to try their method. Hence, we can infer that the subject is being well looked into.

We can also feel the deep interest there is in the subject of motor vehicles from the class of men who write us for estimates on large carriages for 'bus lines, to run where street car lines are questionable. All sorts of delivery and freight wagons are asked for. We touch but the outer edge of the demand with our one hardly-completed, high-priced pleasure carriage.





BAHCC Board Meeting Minutes from August 15, 2018

The meeting was held at the home of Whitney and Diane Haist in Orinda, CA.

- Call to Order—President Ed Archer called the meeting to order at 7:38 p.m.
- **2. Roll Call**—Absent were Johnny and Christine Crowell. Guest present was Jonathan Eugenio.
- 3. Approval of Minutes—The minutes of the Board Meeting of June 20, 2018 were approved as corrected (date of meeting corrected to June 20, 2018, spelling of Bill Hund's name was corrected, and month of Hobby Night was corrected from September to August.)
- 4. Membership Report—Don Azevedo reported that new member George Teebay has submitted his membership application and his dues check and the Board voted to approve his membership pending receipt of his HCCA national number. Note—John Morrison called George Teebay as a follow-up, and Geroge's HCCA national number is 109041.
- **5. Treasurer's Report**—Treasurer Whitney Haist said there was no new banking activity and so the club's checking and saving accounts both remain solvent at this time.
- 6. Website-no report
- 7. National Newsletter—Don Azevedo said he got a call from National Director Keene Brewer. Keene explained that the various National Directors of HCCA had divided up the Regional Groups and were contacting each group to enhance communication between the National Board and the Regional Groups, and that the BAHCC was one of the ones Keene has been assigned to contact. (He contacted Don because the national records still have him listed as President.) As a result of Don and Keene's conversation, it turned out Keene hadn't personally been aware that the BAHCC had a website or a Newsletter. Mark Cerruti then volunteered to include Keene as a regular recipient of our monthly Gaslight Gazette. Ed Harley asked if we should contact Keene to see what he can tell us of interest about other Regional Groups' activities. Consensus is it is a good idea.)
- 8. Whitney Haist said he has heard that various websites have been sued lately by Americans with disabilities lawyers, not necessarily any HCCA related websites that he knows of so far, but that it could be a potential concern in the future to be aware of.
- 9. BAHCC Club Jacket Report—John Morrison said the Pottles are willing to make up anything we want, but we need to decide and to purchase such jackets and let them know exactly what we want on the jackets. John suggested he would try to find jackets like or similar to the blue jackets the HCCA uses, and he said we will need to include a HCCA logo on our club jackets, as per HCCA by-laws, as well as our regional group's logo.
- 10. Club Tent Report—John Morrison reported that Bill Hund has brought the tent (used for the BAHCC's former swap meets) to John Morrison's house, and that John will bring it to Jonathan

Eugenio's house, who in turn will deliver it to Brian Harlamoff for use for future swap meets and other antique car events in the Santa Cruz area.

- 11. A question arose—Should we consider establishing a cost for hard copies of the Gaslight Gazette? It was noted that there are postage costs each month, cost of envelopes, and a possible printing cost should we receive a bill for same. This was discussed, and a motion was passed that starting with our 2019 dues renewal, the membership cost will be \$35/year (no change) but that dues for subscribers wanting hard copies will become \$50/year (the extra fifteen dollars to offset actual costs involved.) Mark Cerruti will include information about this in an upcoming Gaslight Gazette.
- 12. Unfinished Business—Ed Harley mentioned that the annual Joint Board Members and Member Appreciation Dinner meeting, traditionally held in November at the Brass Door Restaurant in San Ramon, will take place on Wednesday, November 14th. (Note: The 14th is the second Wednesday but was chosen due to the timing of Thanksgiving.)
- 13. Sharpsteen Museum display by BAHCC—Mark Cerruti mentioned that Julia Schwartz will be making a proposal for an amount of club money to be used for paper goods, colored cardboard, etc. that will be needed to make our displays especially attractive in the six cabinets that we will be filling up. The consensus was that the Schwartz Family's plans, as well as the Azevedos' and others for the displays, are coming along very nicely. It was suggested that we have tables set up at the September meeting for members to put things on that they bring for the displays. It was also suggested that we make available a video about our hobby, set up as a continuous reel, so that it can be running whenever desirable at the museum during the months of the display.
- 14. New Business—Don Azevedo, as Chairman of the Board, has the task of creating a slate of Board Member Candidates for next year, so he asked which Board Members' terms were expiring and if some would be willing to continue for another term. He also said because of his and Joyce's moving away from the Bay Area, that he would have to be going off of the Board at the end of this year. Don ended up with an idea of which of the current members will still be available for next year, and he will be contacting other potential volunteers as needed to plan for a full slate.
- 15. Enhance content of the Tour Calendar next year—Currently, the Tour Calendar activities have two shades, BOLD for the BAHCC sponsored activities, and NORMAL for the other activates of probable interest to our group, but that are again, put on by other car-related groups. A discussion involved making a Tour Calendar more robust by adding more other activities. The idea met with a consensus of approval.

Next Board Meeting Date—Ed announced it will be at his and Karen's house on September 19th at 7:30.



Newsletter: The deadline for submitting information / articles for the October newsletter is September 23rd.


