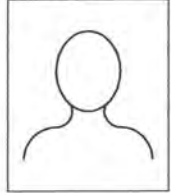

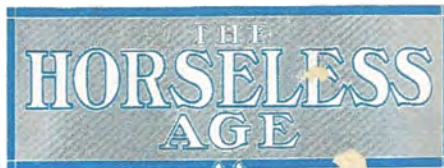

### To Handle Republic Truck Sales.

For the purpose of handling the sales of Republic motor trucks manufactured by the Alma Manufacturing Co., of Alma, Mich., the Alma Motor Truck Co. has been formed, with general offices in Detroit. W. M. Hogle, well known in the motor truck field, has been appointed sales manager of the new company. Hogle, with F. W. Ruggles, factory manager and superintendent of the company, designed the Republic, which is being made in one model only, rated at 1,600 pounds and listing at \$1,425. Immediate arrangements will be made to market the truck from the Detroit offices to the entire United States, much territory having already been allotted. The Star-Tribune Motor Sales Co. will handle the Republic in the State of Michigan, with headquarters in Detroit, where a service station is to be established.

### Walter Kidder Meets Sad Fate

Walter Kidder, president of the Elmhurst Motor Sales Co., Chicago, was found dead under his automobile last week after the machine had leaped from a bridge spanning a small creek between Elmhurst and Utopia, near Chicago. He was buried under the wreckage and suffocated in the mud. Kidder was 25 years old and well known in the Chicago trade.

### Chevrolet Takes Over the Little Car.

A deal which will bring about the merging under one head of interests that have been closely allied was the purchase of the holdings of the Republic Motor Co., of Michigan, by the Chevrolet Motor Co., of Flint and Detroit, Mich. The Republic Motor Co. holdings include the Imperial Wheel Co. plant, the Sterling Engine Co. and the Little Motor Car Co., and these are all now merged in the Chevrolet Motor Co. In the near future the entire outfit, including the Chevrolet Company, will be taken over by the Republic Motor Co., of New York and Boston. Hereafter the complete line of cars made by the Chevrolet and Little companies will be turned out under the title of Chevrolet cars.

There has been no change in the personnel of the Chevrolet Company, the officers being C. M. Begole, president; W. C. Durant, vice-president; A. B. C. Hardy, second vice-president and general manager; C. R. Hathaway, secretary, and W. S. Balenger, treasurer. These officers, with A. G. Bishop and E. R. Campbell, compose the board of directors. William Little, organizer of the Little Company, is to become general manager of the Sterling Engine plant in which the motors for the Little cars are made. Hardy has been made general manager of the combined companies, and E. S. Johnston will remain as sales manager. The Chevrolet Company has a capitalization of \$2,500,000, of which \$500,000 is preferred and \$2,000,000 common stock. It is expected that the complete line of cars will be announced about August 1. The Chevrolet line will now consist of five models, ranging in price from \$690 to \$2,500. A schedule of 8,500 cars is planned for the season's production.

### American Low-Priced Cars Wanted in Italy.

"The automobile industry had a prosperous year in 1912," writes Consul-General James A. Smith from Genoa. "Exports increased and the home demand was good. At the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911, the number of automobiles in use in Italy, including 392 trucks for transporting merchandise, was 11,119. With an increasing production in Italy and a large importation of foreign cars, it is safe to say that to this figure may be added another 3,000 in use at the present time.

"There has been a considerable demand for American cars of light weight and low price, and recently for those of medium price. The opportunities for increasing trade in American automobiles are good, as is indicated by a number of requests made of the consulate general during the year by persons desirous of handling American cars of this class. A car costing the agent here about \$1,200, including transportation and duty amounting to about \$200, should meet with a fair demand."

### Lubricating Plant in Southwest.

The first plant for the manufacture of lubricants in the Southwest is to be established shortly in San Antonio, Tex., at 1622 West Commerce street. The factory is to be operated by the Rubra Lubricating Co., which has plants in Chicago, Cleveland, Findlay and Toronto, and turns out lubricating grease for use on automobiles, trolley cars, etc. The San Antonio plants represent an investment of close to \$10,000.

**PLEASE NOTE:** Your ticket price covers the cost of renting the toilet facility for two days, providing paper plates, cups, plastic cutlery, trash bags, ice, charcoal, propane, drinks and all other items needed to work the grill. The ticket also covers a generous portion of marinated skirt steak and tri-tip for the Saturday potluck, the Sunday breakfast (for those who attend the entire event) and a plentiful supply of sides. It is still encouraged that you bring a share item for the potluck to help us with some variety, but there is always enough food!

## RULES:

- For insurance purposes - membership in the National HCCA is **required for all drivers** - no exceptions. Non-members can be a passenger or join the HCCA. New member special is still in effect and only costs \$19.15 for the first year. Everyone must sign a Liability Release Form to protect the land owner.
- Vintage camp equipment is required. No modern equipment is allowed. Do your best! If you need help, ask!
- Pre - 1932 cars only for the CAMPOUT. Pre WWII cars only for SATURDAY attendees.
- An attempt at wearing vintage clothing should be made by everyone - IE: Overalls, wool pants with suspenders or breeches, boots, plaid shirts, skirts and cotton blouses, funny hats. Again, do your best.
- Bathroom facilities limited to porta-potties. Vintage Coleman lanterns and antique flashlights recommended for nighttime visits. It gets very dark in the canyon.
- No modern electronics - cell phone service is limited at best.
- No firearms or fireworks or hard drinking. No open fires except for a communal fire pit. Participants are expected to behave and to respect the private property, so that events like this can happen in the future at this site.
- No pets allowed without prior permission in respect for the livestock and the possibility of attracting wild animals.
- Space is limited. Registration is closed after May 1st 2019.

## SCHEDULE:

- Friday - optional breakfast tour to the Danvenport Roadhouse. Campers will meet at Todd's at 9:30 and leave Santa Cruz and drive together to Brunch at 10am and then continue to Camp. Campers and Saturday only potluck attendees are both welcome at the Brunch **\*\*BUT YOU MUST RSVP\*\*** so I can give them a head count - see signup sheet. One bill for entire group - bring cash!
- Friday - full event ticket holders will begin arriving at camp to set up. You can come at your leisure or after the Brunch. Directions to the locations will be sent by email to registered participants. There is no scheduled dinner and you will have to bring your own.
- Saturday Morning - breakfast tour to Pescadero. Consider reserving a table at Duarte's Tavern. Otherwise, breakfast on your own.
- Saturday - non campers who are attending the potluck will have a group tour up the coast that is leaving from the Capitola Car Show at 9am - join them for a group tour to the location. Sam Gurnee will be the leader. If you do not wish to follow this tour, directions will be provided to you by email and you may come at any time.
- Saturday Potluck - begins at 2:00. Ticket includes BBQ and as many other sides and drinks as we can afford. We encourage you to bring a side to help with some variety.
- Sunday Morning - breakfast will be served (for overnight campers only) in camp. Sourdough pancakes cooked on site by Ken McCrary. Campers will depart on their own schedule.






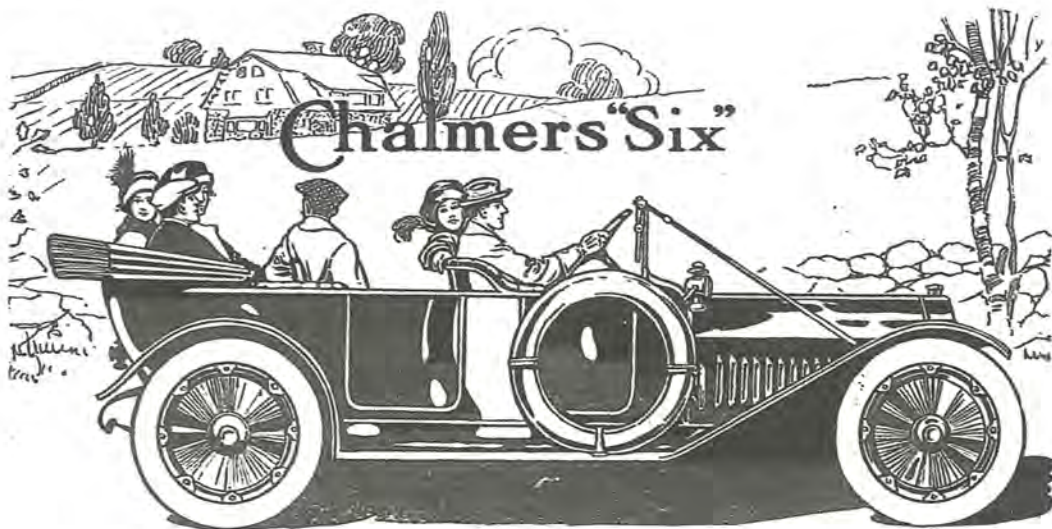

**Adjournment**— The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 p.m.

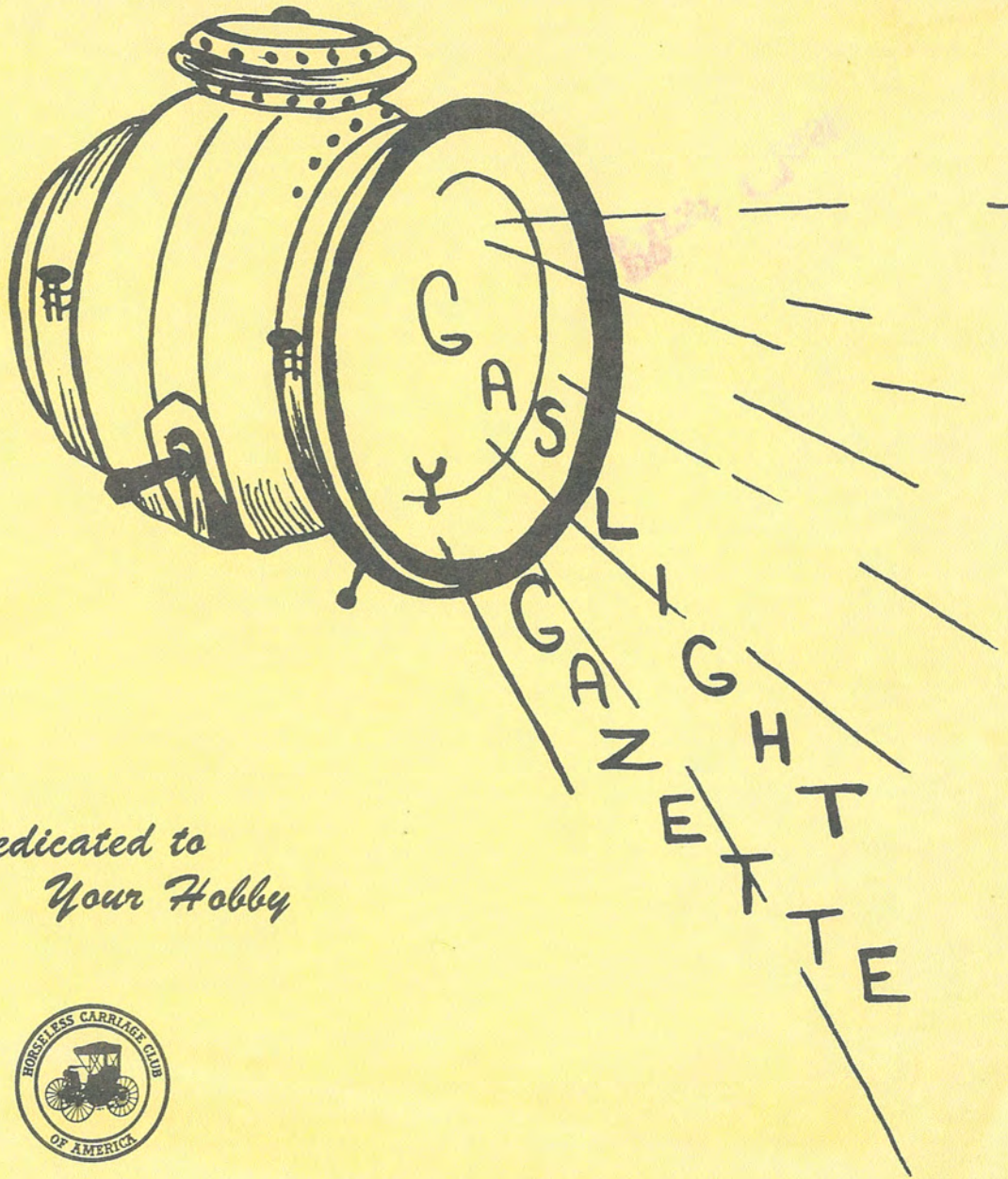

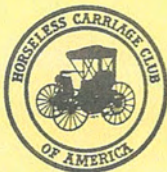
