Nuts & Bolts

I have volunteered to help with the Nuts and Bolts portion of our club this year. I have been in this club a few years but playing with cars all my life. My dad bought our first Horseless Carriage in 1985, a 1909 Maxwell, which neither of us really knew anything about. It was a 1909 Maxwell Runabout, a cool old brass car, which ran but could hardly make it down the block. At the time I had worked for a restoration company a few years, so of course, take it all apart and restore it. Well, this process with many other life distractions, didn't see the road again until about 2014. In the last 35 years we had built a collection of cars from 1909 to the 70's, of which, 6 are pre-1916 cars. Of those 6, 4 are complete and can run with some help and fine tuning. These cars alone can keep me busy, but I am easily distracted by all the others calling for my help.

We have not been able to get together and help each other on our projects, since Covid started. We make do as best we can by networking via phone, email, or zoom meetings. To make an interesting and informative newsletter, we need to add articles to do so, including some Nuts and Bolts information. We would like to hear about what you have been working on, challenges you have faced, and resources you have been able to use to complete your project.

For example; When I last toured my 1909 Maxwell on a 1 & 2 cylinder tour a few years ago, I had noticed one of the front leaf springs had broken a leaf but didn't seem to be a danger to complete the tour. I loaded it in the trailer as usual, and when I had gotten home, found the car had moved/bounced enough in the trailer to break more leaves of that spring. So how or where do I replace this 100 year old spring? After some local searching and networking, found Dixon Spring Company in Dixon, CA, that was able to repair/replace the spring leaves so I could get the car back together again.

I do good with deadlines such that if there is a tour coming in the next year that I want to take a particular car, I will focus my efforts to make that happen. Otherwise I find my self bouncing between 3 or 4 projects at a time, not to mention taking care of all of our other commitments. The only problem with that, is you do not see a lot of progress one project, which can make it seem overwhelming or depressing, but you are still making progress.

Please submit your articles to Mark Cerruti or myself, and as soon as it's safe, we will have an in person Nuts and Bolts!

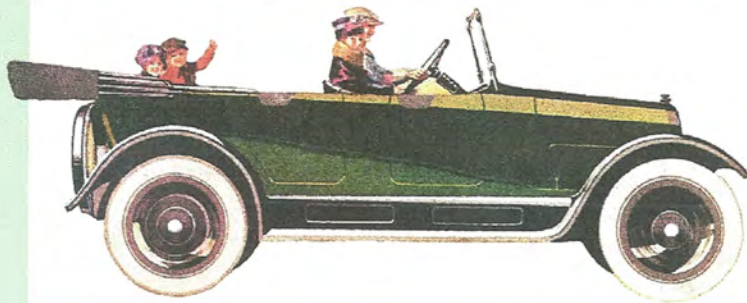

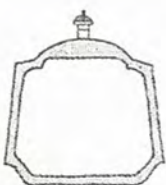

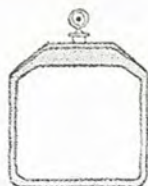

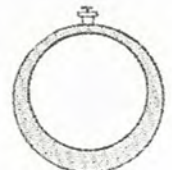

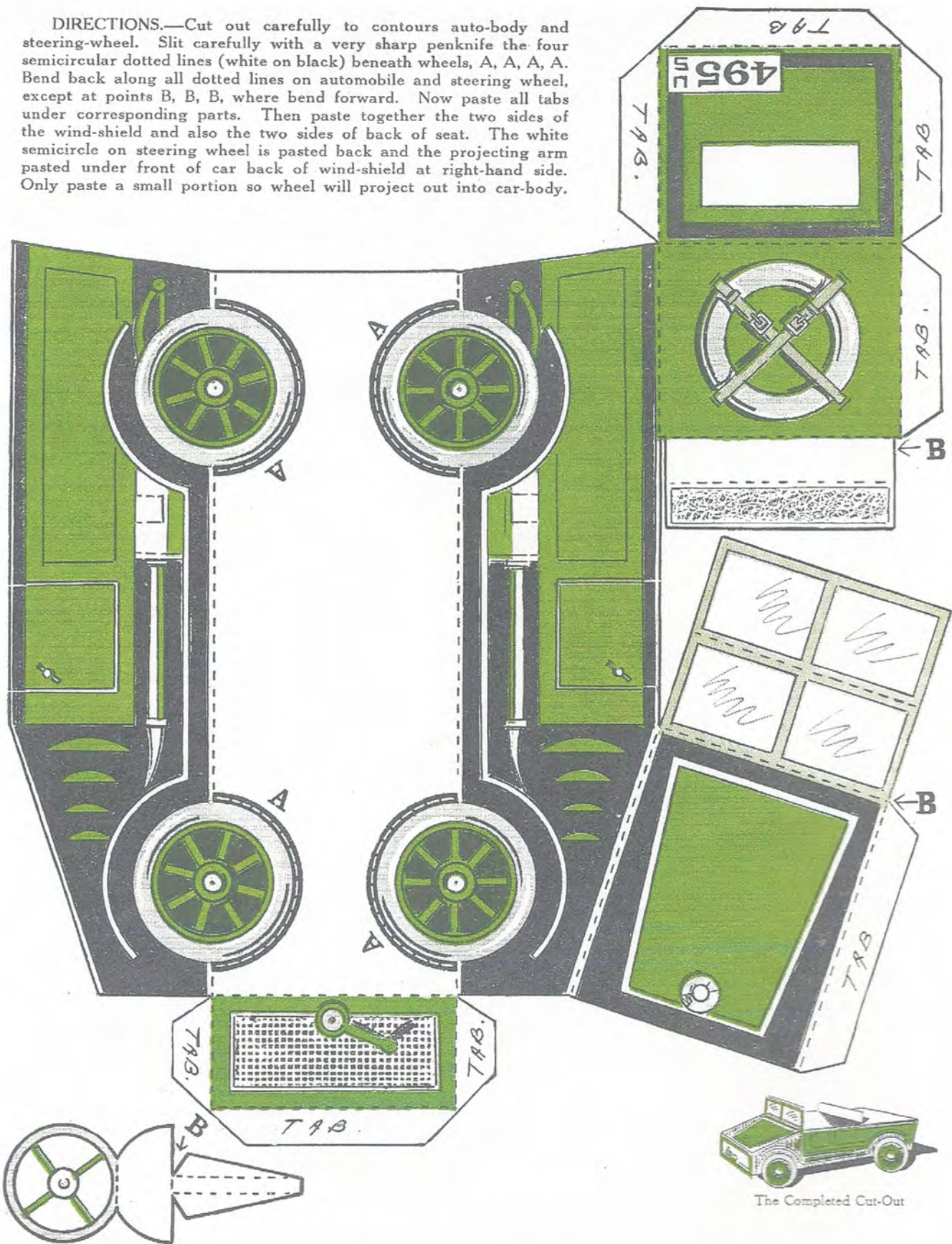

DIRECTIONS.—Cut out carefully to contours auto-body and steering-wheel. Slit carefully with a very sharp penknife the four semicircular dotted lines (white on black) beneath wheels, A, A, A, A. Bend back along all dotted lines on automobile and steering wheel, except at points B, B, B, where bend forward. Now paste all tabs under corresponding parts. Then paste together the two sides of the wind-shield and also the two sides of back of seat. The white semicircle on steering wheel is pasted back and the projecting arm pasted under front of car back of wind-shield at right-hand side. Only paste a small portion so wheel will project out into car-body.

Bay Area Tour Report: Jim Hearn reported 35 people have signed up. The 20th of this month is the deadline. We would like to have 40 cars on the tour.

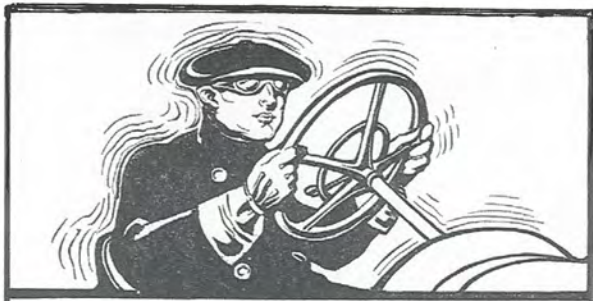

One highlight, a new feature of the web site, is that logged in members will be able to see all classified ads 48 hours before the general public. This is a new benefit of HCCA membership.

During the initial period, the 48 hour delay for new classified ads for non-logged in viewers, will be suspended to ensure all members have had the opportunity to log in, before this is enabled.

This means that for the next few weeks even logged in members will be seeing classified ads as the public sees them, but after that, logged in members will get to see new ads 48 hours ahead of non HCCA members.

Several additional features will be added to the site post launch, including: The Century Plaque Program, Technical Articles, and a new Forum. There is still work to be done, and the site will continue to evolve. However, we are very pleased to get to the launch stage.

As with any newly restored Brass Era car, there will be a period of “tuning” required, before everything runs perfectly. Please forward any questions or comments you may have on the web site, to the HCCA office.
